

The Arabic Alphabet

All 28 letters, in every position they take inside a word

A dot under a letter marks a heavier sound, made further back in the mouth. Sound cues are a rough guide only.

Why six rows are marked in gold

Arabic joins up like handwriting. These six letters never join to the letter that comes after them:

alif

daal

dhaal

So for these six, the Start form looks the same as On its own, and the Middle form looks the same as End.
